Art Class







One of the new classes we have added to our curriculum this academic year is Art. Every Monday and Tuesday, the 7th-12th grade students are taught art by Mrs. Heather Weber, who graduated with an Art Bachelor's degree from Illinois State University. With this class, our Upper Academy students have grown to have an appreciation for art and its history, along with improving their overall presentation with class projects. Mrs. Weber describes the importance of this program with, "God created us with a left brain and a right brain; with a balance of both logical and creative sides. Art teaches us to observe the reality around us and find beauty in what we see. Something as simple as setting up a still life and sitting down to draw or paint it, helps us to truly observe what we are seeing before us, but also allows us to express our own, individual creativity. We communicate through expression and art is a way of expressing. Studying art has even been shown to positively affect overall academic performance, behavior and even compassion."

This month, the students will work towards covering all of the Elements and Principles of Art and Design, and will begin to concentrate on color theory and learn how color can evoke emotion. They will make a basic color wheel and apply the other Elements and Principles they have learned thus far toward still life and other projects, but in conjunction with the use of color.

## Serior Girls Retreat Trip

At the end of January, the senior girls traveled to Kansas to attend their Senior Ignatian retreat, a retreat focused on the Christian's preeminent response to the life of Christ. The meditations, silence, and rules for discernment are important for young people during their time of decision. The daily schedule included morning meditation and Mass at 7:00 AM, conferences and instruction, consultations with the priests, and compline at 8:30. After a week of silence and reflection, the girls had a chance to visit the campus of St. Mary's College where several of them hope to attend next year. Father McFarland led the retreat. The Academy gladly welcomed them back last week.









### Inside the Classroom

Mrs. Wantland's Kindergarten Class

The Kindergarten class is learning a Montessori method of education. In Math, they are currently mastering skip counting 2s, 5s, and 10s and studying place value of units, tens, hundreds and thousands. For Reading, each child will read from a personalized reader chosen just for them and then we read together as a class. In **Writing**, each child has been writing words with the moveable alphabet for some time now, so they will now begin to write in their journals. **In Art and Music,** they highlight a particular artist/composer each month to study. In Geography, they have been "traveling" to different continents. They highlight the climate, geography, plants, animals and customs of each "travel" place. As February marks the month Arizona became a state, they will study the plants and animals of the desert, as well as the symbolism included in the design of our state flag.

with Sister Maria Catarina

**Q:** Where were you born and raised? A: I was born in Carcassonne in the south of France. I grew up in the country and enjoyed the pleasant company of cows, sheep, chickens, rabbits and two donkeys named Cleopatra and Caesar.

Q: Why did you enter the convent? A: I always dreamed of going to the missions and of helping others. I loved my sojourn in India so much that upon my return to France, everything seemed different and hard. I didn't like the French food, I missed wearing a sari... In short, I was homesick for India. I had to go back. It was during this second visit that I realized something was missing in my life. I understood that God was calling me to the religious life. It was as if I had been blind but finally my vision had cleared and I discovered a new. So, after my 2nd stay in India had come to an end, I joined the Consoling Sisters in Italy in the May of 2014.

Q: Describe your daily routine as a sister? A: 6:00am Rise. 6:30am Morning prayers, Prime, meditation, Mass. 8:25am Breakfast and end of Grand Silence. 8:40am Cleaning, teaching, laundry and other work. 12:15pm Sext followed by lunch. 1:45pm half hour of recreation or teaching. 2:15pm Free time during which we can work, study, sew, prepare for classes, pray, rest, etc. 3:45pm Half-hour of class (music, liturgy, religious life). 4:30pm Half-hour of spiritual reading. 5:00pm Afternoon prayers, Vespers, meditation, rosary followed by dinner. 7:55pm Evening Recreation. 8:25pm Compline and Evening Prayers, Grand Silence starts. 10:30pm Lights out. We try to offer all our day as a continual prayer to Console the Sacred Heart. Each sister also has a day of the week in which she makes an hour of adoration before the Blessed Sacrament.

Q: Share your advice to a young girl that's thinking about the religious life. A: To a young girl, I would say "God loves you and knows very well what is best for you. So, follow Him and let yourself be loved by the King of Kings."
