OLSA INTERVIEW

with Miss Gabrielle Saurette - Language Arts and Latin Teacher & Educational Development

Q: Where were you born and raised? How many siblings do you have? A: I was born in Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada and spent my childhood in Calgary, Alberta and Post Falls, Idaho. I have an older brother, and four younger sisters.

Q: If you could take your class on a field trip to anywhere in the US, where would you go? A: I would take my class to Glacier National Park, to Going-to-the-Sun Road, where the Rocky Mountains launch out of the valley and where a Depression Era two-lane road allows tourists to drive towards the sunrise. As you drive up, you leave the tree-line behind. Mountain goats tug at grass between the boulders. Glaciers hug the peaks. Mountains are just mountains, to be sure, but they are also a meditation on how insignificant our problems are compared to God and His grace.

Q: Which class project was your favorite to assign? A: I haven't assigned my favorite project yet at Our Lady of Sorrows. It's a project in which students write a Forensic Mental Health Assessment for a character in a Greek Play - is he responsible for his actions and able to stand trial or is he mentally impaired? I like this assignment because it's a real-world writing task - students take on the role of a lawyer, a clerk and a psychiatrist - but it requires attention to the words and meaning of the text as well. The groups' results are always different, showing them how evidence and interpretation of evidence is important in a trial.
